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Prof. Dr. Robin Boast

Professor of Cultural Information Science (Culturele informatiewetenschap) University of Amsterdam

For over thirty years, the history, practice, theory and production of information in cultural institutions and society have been central to the scientific work of Robin Boast. He has done research in the field of information studies in the United States, India, Australia, United Kingdom and Europe. Boast's research and work has focused on diverse topics, ranging from the history of knowledge and its categories, to the first digital collection projects in museums and universities in the seventies, to the more recent emergence of the Web and ubiquitous computing. Robin Boast is the Professor of Cultural Information Science in Media Studies at the University of Amsterdam (UvA).

Boast's research builds on the programs of cultural knowledge with respect to appropriation, naming and dissemination of information. Throughout the history of digitality he has exposed misconceptions about digital resources and their culture consequences. His recent research has focused on local knowledge and emergent systems across incommensurable expert communities (indigenous and scientific), where he focuses on the study and development of open source, social and distributive systems that entitle, more than ever before, key knowledge experts to be included in the process of interpretation in cultural institutions.

Prof. Boast is also designing and coordinating a new BA in Media and Information (Media Studies, UvA), which will begin in 2014, that takes as its primary subject the qualities and consequences of ubiquitous information assemblage.

Executive Director of the Europeana Foundation

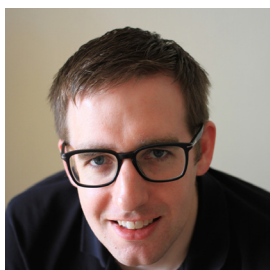

Prof. Dr. Costis Dallas

Director of Museum Studies and Associate Professor, Faculty of Information, University of Toronto;
Assistant Professor, Panteion University; Research Fellow, Digital Curation Unit, Athena Research Centre

For the last eighteen years Costis taught at the Department of Communication, Media of Culture, Panteion University, Athens. Since 2012 he is the director of museum studies and an associate professor at the Faculty of Information, University of Toronto. His work as Research Fellow of the Digital Curation Unit-IMIS, Athena Research Centre and as co-principal investigator in the CARARE, LoCloud, Europeana Cloud and ARIADNE projects focuses on understanding knowledge practices in the field of cultural heritage and humanities scholarship, on metadata and knowledge representation of material culture, and on the specifications of curation-aware cultural heritage metadata repositories. Costis co-chairs the VCC2 WG on "Understanding and expanding scholarly practice", currently conducting a trans-European survey on the habits and digital needs of humanities researchers, and working on the development of a scholarly methods ontology under the auspices of the NeDiMAH network. His major personal research project is on a theoretical framework for the digital curation of "thing cultures", integrating historical approaches to the representation and study of cultural objects with methodologies, infrastructures and environments intended for the management, preservation and use of digital information. He holds a BA degree in history from the University of Ioannina, and MPhil and DPhil degrees in Classical archaeology from the University of Oxford.

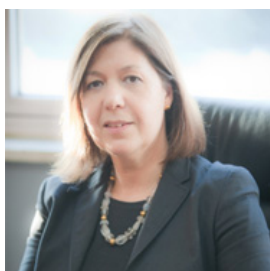


Nicholas Hall

Dr. Sachini has served as a national expert for and national representative to the European Commission on issues of research and innovation, digital libraries, exploitation of research results and the support of the European Research Area.

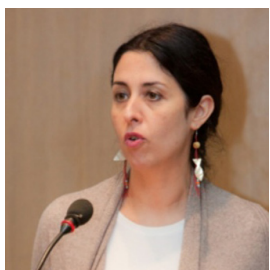


Prodromos Tsiavos

He read law and Information Systems in Athens and London and holds a PhD in Law and Information Systems from the LSE.

Prodromos has worked as an adviser for a number of public sector institutions and private cultural and creative industry organisations on legal issues of open data, FOSS, open hardware and open innovation/ fabrication and has participated in a series of legislative committees on issues of information and open data regulation. He is heading the licensing working group in the LAPSI2 project for the implementation of the amended version of the Public Sector Information Directive and is a senior research fellow at the Media Institute at the University College London (UCL).

Head of the ePublishing and Social Sciences and Humanities Unit

Victoria has worked since 2009 at the National Documentation Centre (EKT), in Athens. She earned her PhD and MA in Classical Archaeology at Bryn Mawr College, PA, USA and her BA in History and Archaeology at Aristotle University, Thessaloniki, Greece.

At EKT Victoria oversees the organization's strategy and initiatives for e-science in the Social Sciences and the Humanities, placing an emphasis on e-infrastructure, new paths for scholarly communication, and open access to scientific and cultural information. Current flagship initiatives she supervises include the Greek Reference Index for the Social Sciences and the Humanities (portal under construction), the <http://openarchives.gr> portal, harvesting high-quality research and cultural material from Greek institutions, [ePublishing@EKT](mailto:EPublishing@EKT) (<http://epublishing.ekt.gr>) a nation-wide not-for-profit publishing e-infrastructure service for the Greek scientific community. She is the scientific coordinator of the open access policy support project PASTEUR4OA (www.pasteur4oa.eu) and coordinates the organization's participation in various EU projects that relate to open access, such as www.openaire.eu. She serves as member of European Commission's expert groups for scientific information, and as a reviewer for projects and publications in scholarly communications and e-infrastructures. She publishes in scholarly communications, open access and research policy and archaeology.
